From the Vicarage

Dear Friends,



Summer is near. The days are longer, the sun brighter, and the pace of life begins to shift. Many of us spend more time outdoors. It's a season to pause, notice, and give thanks for the good things we're often too busy to see.

At the end of this month, the Church celebrates the feast of St Peter and St Paul. These two men—so different in background and character—are remembered together because both were chosen by Christ and both gave their lives for the Gospel.

Peter was a fisherman. He was impulsive, often unsure, and he denied Jesus in His final hours. Yet Jesus called him the rock on which the Church would be built.

Paul was a Pharisee, trained in the law. He once persecuted Christians and stood by at the death of Stephen. But when Christ confronted him on the road to Damascus, his life changed completely

Their stories remind us that Christ calls real people, not perfect ones. He forgives, restores, and sends out those who turn to Him

That speaks clearly to us today. We live in a time of confusion and noise. Peter and Paul show us how to live with faith, courage, and hope. Peter points us to a faith that is honest and open. Paul calls us to a faith that thinks clearly and speaks boldly. We need both.

Summer offers many of us the chance to slow down. Take that time to pray, to listen, to return to Christ. Read the Gospels. Let His words shape your heart. Let His truth speak into your life.

May your summer be one of rest, peace, and renewal. And may we, like Peter and Paul, follow Christ without fear.

From the Archives Taken from St James's Parish Magazine, July 1929

"St. James's Elmers End - Garden Fete."

A better day could not have been chosen for the above event than June 19th; that being so one can hardly be surprised that a happy crowd of visitors throned the Vicarage garden from 3 o'clock in the afternoon up to the closing hour.

The assembled parishioners and digntaries were provided with much entrainment. There was not a single dull moment. Those who were "on pleasure bent" wended their joyous way to the "Waterfield" and there found an ample variety of diversions appealing alike to the sense of sport and honour.

When, at 9.30pm, the Vicar blew his whistle, the general feeling was that "the end of a perfect day" had come, and all went home to dream happily of the day's events".



Duchenne Dash 2025

Hayley from St Michael's Church is taking part in the Duchenne Dash 2025, a remarkable cycling event that challenges riders to cover 300km from London to Paris in just 24 hours to raise money for Duchenne UK, and she is kindly asking for your sponsorship. Yes, you read that correctly - 24 hours to get from London to Paris on a bike! 24 hours of peddling and enjoying the comfort of a bicycle saddle...

But this journey is about more than the miles; it's about winning the race to end the devastating impacts of Duchenne muscular dystrophy (DMD), a cruel muscle-wasting disease that affects thousands of boys in the UK. There's currently no cure and life expectancy is mid-twenties. Families can only watch as their sons lose the ability to walk, to raise their arms for a hug, to wave hello. It's heartbreaking. The charity was set up in 2012 by Emily Reuben and Alex Johnson, two mums of boys who were diagnosed with the condition. They'd been told by doctors to go home and enjoy what short time they would have with their sons before they died in their teens. But instead of just accepting fate, they chose to fight for their children; to fight for a cure, for better care, more research, and better equipment to enable them to live with dignity and independence.

Because of Emily and Alex and the work of Duchenne UK, there is now hope for these boys and their families. By establishing better standards of care through the DMD Care project, boys are living longer and with better health. And through the DMD Hubs project more boys than ever before are taking part in clinical trials in the UK to uncover potential treatments. Duchenne UK won't give up until we see the end of DMD and its devastating impacts.

Drug development takes a long time so two years ago Duchenne UK started looking into the development of new technology to improve independence and quality of life for boys with DMD in the here and now. Which is where Hayley comes in. She is a product designer and is using her skills to help design innovative assistive technology like Elevex, an exoskeleton for the arms which will help boys to continue doing the things we take for granted, like eating and drinking independently or hugging their parents, even as their strength diminishes.

St James's PCC meet on Thursday 10th April 2025. There were 9 members present and 3 apologies.

The after accepting the minutes of the meeting held on 12th February, a report was given on finances. It was reported that we had an underspend of \pounds 596.33 but account must be taken of the gas reimbursement of \pounds 2021.40. We raise \pounds 644 from the quiz night.

The committees reported back to the PCC including the Finance committee reporting on salaries and hall letting licenses, Lloyds Way committee on works being undertaken in the house and the Building Committee on works that needed to be carried out.

A report was given on the Deanery Synod meeting held on the 10th March at which The Bishop of Rochester and the Archdeacon presented the updated Diocesan strategy. The new Area Dean of Beckenham, The Rev. Richard Jones was also commissioned.

An update was given on the progress of the ongoing repair to the organ blower, including the recommendation that nothing is stored on top of it.

The Accounts for 2024 and the Annual report for 2024 were approved.

In any other business it was reported on how successful the Mothering Sunday Service has been received.


It was agreed the date of the next meeting would be 11th June 2025.

Why aren't dinosaurs in the Bible?

The Bible also teaches that God loves it when people explore His creation, and science is a great way of doing that. So, for many Christians, science is one of the fun things we can use to learn all about how God made everything, including all of the dinosaurs!

Were humans and dinosaurs ever living on earth at the same time?

Yes! But probably not the kind of dinosaur you're thinking of! Most of the dinosaurs died out a very, very long time ago, way before humans first lived. But some of the smaller, feathery dinosaurs survived and over a long time they have evolved into the animals we call birds.
