Our worship and service continue over the summer. Please keep in touch with what's happening in the parish. Whether you are here every Sunday or away for a time, you remain part of the life of our church.


Let's come together to celebrate St James and ask for his prayers. May we, like him, learn to follow Christ with open hands and willing hearts.

St James's Fellowship

These meetings are open to all. We meet at 2 pm in the Guild Room. Our meetings all end with a cuppa and biscuits, and a natter, and is a very pleasant way of spending a Friday afternoon. We shall not be meeting in August. Please keep your eyes open for details of meetings in the autumn.

What an interesting meeting we had on 2 May, with a talk from a member of Bromley Council trading standards team who alerted us to the strategies used by seemingly well-meaning fraudsters. Anyone can be a victim of their sophisticated ploys which can cost dear, and line their pockets.

Never trust tradesmen who come to the door. If somebody tells you some work needs to be done ask them to call back when you have somebody with you, and don't feel pressurised into anything, especially if you're asked to pay up front. If you need a service ask around and get a recommendation. Bromley Trading Standards runs a fair-trader directory to help you find a trustworthy trader.

You may get a phone call from someone alleging to be from your bank. NEVER disclose your bank details. Say you'll call back. But beware, fraudsters can play with phone lines. You may think the line has been cleared, but in fact you're still connected. Try calling a friend first, and see if you get through. If you think you have been scammed ring 159. This is the equivalent of 999, and you will be put through to your own bank where you can report the situation.

On 6 June our organist, Andrew, treated us to a piano recital in church. This event was well supported. Thank you so much, Andrew, for a lovely relaxing time – just what the doctor ordered on an early summer afternoon.

Friday 4th July - we shall be having a talk from a representative from the Royal National Lifeboat Institute giving us some insight into their job of saving lives at sea. Although the RNLI provides an essential emergency service around the coasts, it is funded by charity and donations, and manned by volunteers, many of whom have lost their lives in the service. It received royal patronage in 1854, and this has continued up to the present day.

St James's Day

This year we will be celebrating St James's Day on Sunday 27th July with a special Mass at 5pm followed by a reception. It is a great pleasure that one of St James's former curates, Fr Andrew Davis, will be our preacher. Please put this date in your diary and invite friends and family to join us. Churches Together in Beckenham

The Lent events organised by CTiB were a great success. There were 4 courses held over 5 weeks during Lent at St. John's Church, Eden Park. Additionally the Good Friday Walk of Witness was well attended, and did what it set out to do, to let the people of Beckenham know that this wasn't just a day off work, an extension of Saturday, but a special day in the Church's calendar. What makes it so special is that churches of all traditions and denominations in Beckenham take part.

A date couldn't be arranged for the summer picnic this year. Suggestions did take it into late September, so it was decided to give this a miss in 2025.

We heard from churches as to their fund raising for Christian Aid Week. These initiatives are proving much more popular than doing the house to house collections, and encourage members of different churches to work together, as witnessed by teams from other churches at the St. James's quiz.

St Michael's PCC Round up

St Michael's Parochial Church Council (PCC) met on Sunday 1st June to review parish matters and make key decisions for the months ahead.

Fr Russell began the meeting by updating members on the progress of the Hall endowment scheme. A financial report was then received. While the parish remains in a healthy position overall, it was noted that general giving has fallen.


The PCC reviewed a recently commissioned fire safety report. It was agreed that an action plan would be drawn up to address the necessary works identified.

With the current waste disposal contract coming to an end, the PCC agreed to renew the agreement with the existing supplier for a further 36 months.

A working group will be set up to finalise decisions on proposed new signage and window graphics for the church.

Looking ahead to St Michael's Day, it was agreed to hold a "Bring and Share" lunch on the Sunday. Refreshments following the Confirmation service on the Monday will be arranged through external caterers.

Finally, the PCC discussed the future growth and mission of the parish. It was agreed to begin exploring the recruitment of an outreach and family worker to support this work.

St James's PCC Round up

The PCC met on Wednesday 11 June at St James's Church. Eleven members attended, with apologies from one.

We began by approving the minutes of our April and May meetings. Several key appointments were then made:

Safeguarding Officer – Alison Mansfield DBS Officers – Fr Russell and the Parish Administrator Gift Aid Secretary – Parish Administrator Collator and Archivist – Elizabeth Gibson

Our Treasurer gave an update on church finances. We discussed the VAT rebate on gas and the licence agreements for the Pre-School (using the Hall) and the Basic Skills Group (using the Servers' Vestry).

Committee reports followed. The Curate's House in Lloyds Way needs a new kitchen; three quotes were reviewed, and one was chosen. The Internal and Social Affairs Committee updated us on upcoming events including a summer BBQ, Afternoon Tea, and the Autumn Fair. The External Affairs Committee thanked everyone who supported the recent Christian Aid and Lent quizzes.

Our Deanery Synod reps reported they are enjoying the new Synod format, which includes worship. They warmly invite anyone interested to attend the next meeting, which will be held at St James's.

We also discussed church grounds and signage, following a request at the APCM. Fr Russell will be meeting a local sign maker and hopes to bring design proposals to our next meeting. A small team has cleared weeds from the churchyard, and an eco-friendly weed killer has been applied. Fr Russell is also looking into installing a CCTV camera to help with repeated problems at the Southwest Door.

After dealing with other formal matters and setting dates for future meetings, we closed with prayer.



From the Archives *Taken from St James's Parish Magazine, July 1954*

The Reredos Painting of the "Resurrection" by A. K. Lawrence RA. *The Architect's Impression*

Let me first remember that the primary object of a painting which is to form the centre piece of a Reredos is that it should have a great devotional value.

When it is viewed in the finest setting that any religious work could possibly have, it must quicken the spiritual senses of the observers to such an extent that they feel transported to the scene portrayed, and are therefore the greater comforted by their experience.

It is essential that the message be



conveyed in the simplest and yet most powerful way in scale, composition and colour. This is particularly important where the setting is some distance from the congregation, as in this case.

To my mind it is also essential to obtain as great a sense of movement as possible, hence the fact that Our Lord is not on a pedestal, or something equivalent, as would have apparently been preferred by the art critic of "The Times." This is not meant to be the painting of a stone statue, but something immortally alive; HE is meant to be rising from the grave in every sense of the words, and the artist shows it at that very moment.

Our Lord is being attended by two Archangels with delicate and loving care, which is well portrayed in their tender facial expressions and the manner in which the grave clothes are being held.

To maintain the sense of movement upwards there is the suggestion of Heaven in the small bright clouds in the extreme top centre of the picture, which gives the important sense of the unlimited. Some critics have objected to the amount of blood on the cloth and from the wounded side, but much blood must have flowed, and by showing it the agony of the Crucifixion is brought more forcibly to the mind.

The Resurrection is commemorated in every part of the Christian world on Sunday mornings, and the Kent landscape in the background is meant to symbolize the local devotion to this universal event. How often have we seen the cold clear east light on the cliffs of Dover exactly as on this first morning. Mr. Lawrence has bathed the whole scene in this light in a most satisfying manner.

To the left of Our Lord, the fallen cross represents the victory over the evil things existing prior to the Resurrection, of which the system of crucifixion was the symbol. The Cross on the Altar in the foreground represents the new hope built up from the ruin of the old.

The trees to the right are a mixture of evergreen and the newly budding; the former depicts those things in the life which live on in an unchanged form, while the latter represents those things which have an annual cycle of rebirth which can be taken as representing the eternal miracle of Spring.

The two central figures kneeling in the foreground are Mr. and Mrs. Percy Jones, in whose memory the picture is given, and those on either side represent people taken from the various occupations that they were interested in. There is a factory worker, the doctor, the nurse, the Royal West Kent soldier, youth and aged, all kneeling in adoration.

Some critics have taken exception to modern figures in such a picture, but they seem conveniently to forget that all the great paintings of the past have figures dressed in the costume of the day. This painting represents our modern worship, in Kent, of the great event that took place nineteen hundred and twenty-two years ago.

In conclusion, there is no doubt in my mind that Mr. Lawrence has met all the essentials of a religious painting in full measure, and I feel that its devotional value to all who worship at St. James' will be immense and I trust that the finished work as a whole will amply justify my words.
