contributions in support of St Christopher's Hospice, a cause that is deeply valued by many in our community.



# Interfaith Week Gathering

On Monday 10th November, during Interfaith Week, our MP Liam Conlon invited members of faith communities from across Beckenham and Penge to gather and celebrate this year's theme, Community: Together We Serve.

Interfaith Week is a national event that aims to strengthen good relations between people of different faiths and beliefs. It encourages understanding, respect, and cooperation, reminding us that while our traditions may differ, we share a common desire to care for one another and for the communities we live in.

Around 250 people came to St George's Church for the event. During the evening we heard from several faith leaders, including a Hindu priest, a Buddhist monk, the Chair of Bromley Reformed Synagogue, Fr Ashley, a Roman Catholic priest, a member of the Beckenham Islamic community, a member of Croydon Sikh Gurdwara, and Rachel Winn from St Paul's.



Each speaker shared an interesting take on the theme, showing how their communities are working to serve the wider community. In essence, all their messages came down to the same thing — love.

A highlight of the evening was the song performed by the choir from St Anthony's School. There were few dry eyes in the church as they sang.


We hope this will become a regular event in the years ahead.

# News from 6th Guides

We had a successful summer camp with hot days and very wet evenings, luckily the rain fell just as we had finished eating and the guides took shelter in their tents, this put



the wide game on hold. It was the final of the Women's Euro Championships and there was a Scout group on our site who had rigged up a 'Heath Robinson' projector and the Guides were able to watch the penatly shoot out. With the winning resut out dessert was Eton Mess and a Red George Cross was added using the summer fruits that we had left over. I had Guides asking me if we would be coming back to Blacklands next next before the camp had finished!!

This term has been a strange one with various leaders running the meetings while I have been recovering and I have attended when I can. We had an evening up at Heartsease to complete our Have Adventure theme badge and Lava lamps were made along with volcanic film pots.

You may have heard of the 'Eco Church' initiative, which provides a framework to take practical action caring for God's earth, covering various areas of church life. Rocha UK is a Christian charity working to protect and restore the natural world and committed to equipping Christian and churches in the UK to care for the environment. They run a scheme whereby churches can be assessed for their progress towards a bronze, silver or gold Eco Church award. We at St. James's may not be up for this, but we can do our bit by recycling. Once our new bins are in situ we would ask everybody to be sure to recycle items in the correct bin.

We would also ask all users of our premises to turn off lights when the area is not in use, and be careful with use of the utilities. Our expenditure for gas and electricity has increased substantially over the last years, and we would like to avoid any wastage.





On the subject of caring for God's earth, I am sure you'll all have noticed how beautiful our grounds are, with flowers in due season, and the lawns so wonderfully manicured. This provides an environment for the local wildlife, and an attractive area for our congregation and residents. Unfortunately it does attract the foxes who often leave their calling cards, but that's nature. Thanks to the team who work so hard ensuring that the gardens are well maintained and eyecatching.

We have learnt about money by purchasing items with a random prices and selecting the exact coins to meet the price, the first team with the correct cost won the item.


They have made their own paint and used the primary colours to make differest colours.

# What is Epiphany about?

I was recently asked a question by a member of the congregation about Epiphany, so I thought I would answer it here.

The Feast of Epiphany is one of the most significant celebrations in the Church's year because it proclaims that Jesus Christ is revealed as the Son of God—not just to Israel, but to all nations. The word Epiphany means "manifestation," and this feast reminds us that Christ's mission is universal. This truth is beautifully expressed in the visit of the Magi,



who represent the Gentiles coming to worship the newborn King.

Their gifts speak volumes: gold for His kingship, frankincense for His divinity and priestly role, and myrrh for His humanity and the suffering He will endure. In these offerings, the mystery of the Incarnation shines forth.

Epiphany also marks the culmination of the Christmas season, moving our gaze from the hidden birth in Bethlehem to the public revelation of Christ's glory. In many traditions, this feast gathers together several great "manifestations": the visit of the Magi, the Baptism of Jesus in the Jordan, and the Wedding at Cana—each revealing who Christ truly is.

For us today, Epiphany is more than a historical event; it is a call to mission. Isaiah's words echo through the liturgy: "Arise, shine, for your light has come." Just as the star led the Magi, so the Church is called to be a light to the nations, bearing Christ to every corner of the world. It is a feast of revelation, hope, and invitation—a reminder that God's glory is not hidden but offered



# Week of Prayer for Christian Unity



The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is an ecumenical Christian observance celebrated internationally in the Christian calendar traditionally from 18th - 25th January, the octave of St. Peter and St. Paul.

For 2026 the theme is 'There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope of your calling' (Ephesians 4:4). The reflections this week have been prepared by the Armenian Apostolic Church, along with their Catholic and Evangelical counterparts, emphasising the unity of of Christians, drawing from the apostle Paul .

As this newsletter goes to print the the programme for the week is still 'work in progress'. The cafe at St. John's Church, Eden Park, is a possible venue, and hopefully the programme will include the usual campfire worship and Taize service.

It is so rewarding to share worship with Christians of other traditions. How many of you have been to a Taize service? Or campfire worship? Events will be publicised on the notices on the service sheets nearer the time.


